CONFLICT	God sends Haggai and Zechariah to confront their apathy and to command the temple rebuilding to resume.	God sends Ezra to confront the people's apathetic rebellion in abandoning the covenant with God for other pagan women.	God sends Nehemiah to confront the people's fear of their neighbors, unethical financial practices, and to restore the walls of Jerusalem.	God sends Jesus to confront the people's true problem – their hearts are not capable of faithfully following God.
COMMITMENT	The returnees faithfully turn their actions to following God's command and rebuild the Temple. They celebrate the dedication of God's house being rebuilt.	The returnees confess and repent of their sin. They even take the drastic action of divorcing the pagan women and send them out of the land so they can be "holy"	The returnees faithfully work on the rebuilding of the walls and the repopulation of the holy city. Once again, there is a renewal of commitment to obey Yahweh.	Jesus fulfills the mission on his own.  He sacrifices himself on behalf of those who would believe on Him and follow God's path of salvation.
